ANACT

Against Unlicensed and Scandalous

Books and Pamphlets,

And for better Regulating of PRINTING



Mortest in organization to the color of which is a fine of the color o

hereas divers scandalous, seditious and sibellous Pamphlets, Papers and Books are daily contribed, printed, vended and dispersed, with officious care and industry by the Malignant party at home and abroad, for the hetter compas-

ty at home and abroad, for the better compacting of their wicked ends, The subbersion of the Parliament and present Government, which they well know cannot with more ease be attempted, then by Lyes and falle Suggestions, cunningly infinuated and spread amongst the People, and by malicious misrepresentation of things acted and done, to take off and divide their affections from that Just Anthority which is set over them sor their good and safety, and to bring a low and mean esteem upon the persons, and a suspition and hatred upon the courses

(534) and intentions of the faithful Dembers of the Peoples Representative in Parliament, and of other Ministers of State, serving the Commonwealth in their several Subordinations: especially such who are most constant and conscientious in discharge of their Trust, and are therefore become the utmost object of their weetched spleen and malice: And whereas a great occasion of these mischiefs, and scandals, and diffatisfaction of many, hath been as well the ianozance and assumed boldness of the weekly Pamphleteers, without leave or due Information, taking upon them to publich, and at pleasure to censure the Proceedings of Parliament and Army, and other Affairs of State; as also the irregularity and licenticulness of Drinting, the Art whereof in this Commonwealth, and in all forreign parts, hath been and ought to be restrained from too arbitrary and general an exercise: To prebent the many mischiefs inevitably following thereupon, The Parliament of England duly confidering the pie= miles, and willing to apply fit remedy herein. Do Enact and Ordain, and be it by the Authority aforesaid Enacted and Ordained, That the Laws made formerly, and at this present Parliament, now in force for punishment of devilers and spreaders of false and seditious News, Lyes and Rumors, by writing, printing, speaking, or otherwife, thall be put in due and diligent execution, according to the tenor of the same Acts; And for further remedy, Be it Enacted and Ordained, That no person or persons whatfoever, thall prefume to make, Waite, print, publin, fell or utter, or cause to be made, printed or uttered, any scandalous or libelious Books, damphlets, Papers of Pictures Whatfoeder,

(535) thou the Penalties following; that is to lay, The Author of fuch Books, Pictures or Papers, thail forfeit Ten pounds, or be Imprisoned in the Common Goal of the County of Als berty where the Offence is committed, or the Offender Chail be found, until he chall pay the fame, to that the Impallonment exceed not forty days; The Printer to forfeit and pay five pounds, and fuffer the like Imprisonment, until he pay the same, the said Imprisonment not exceeding twenty days, and likewife to have his Press and Implements of Imprinting feized, and broken in pieces; The Bookleller and Stationer to forfeit and pap Forty Chillings, or be Implifoned in like maner, until he pay the fame, the Imprisonment not exceeding ten days. And beit further Enacted, That if any person happen to buy any such seditions, scandalous or ithellous Pamphlets or Papers, and Chall not within four and twenty hours after knowledge thereof, bring them to the Lord Major of London (if the buyers reliance be there) or to some other Justice of the Peace Within the County, City of Liberty where such Buyers Chall then happen to be, to be sent up, and disposed of as by this Act is afterwards mentioned, and give notice likewise of the party or parties of whom he or they had or bought the same, shall forfeit for every such omission the sum of Twenty Chillings for every such concealed Paper, Pam= phlet of Book, to be disposed of as is herein after mentioned. And for the prevention of falle, imperfect and impertment Relations of Parliamentary Proceedings, and other fuch Occurrences and News, the truth whereof may be fit to be known and published, for the satisfaction of all the good people of this Commonwealth therein

therein interested, and of all the Well-affected thereto, in the clear Information of the Cate of Affairs; Be it Enacted by the Authority afores laid. That no person whatsoever that compose, write, print, publish, sell or utter, or cause to be made, written, printed or uttered, any Book or Pamphlet, Treatife, theet or theets of News Whatsoever, unless Licensed (as is hereafter mentioned) upon the like Penalty as upon the Maker, writer, Printer, Bookleller and Stationer respectively of scandalous Books and Pamphlets, both for fine and Imprisonment, is herein before limited and appointed. And be it further Enacted and Didained, That the Offender aforesaid thall be discovered, the Offences peard and examined, and the Penalties levied and disposed of in such sort, maner and form as is limited, directed and expressed in an Didis nance of Parliament, made in Septemb. Dne thoufand fir bundzed forty and feven, Against Unlicensed Pamphlets, and for the better Regulating of Printing. Provided, That so much of the laid Dedinance as specifies the imposition of Penalties upon fuch Offenders as are before mentioned, in respect that higher Penalties are in Gead thereof herein limited and deligned, chall stand from henceforth Revealed, and be of no further effect. And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, that all former Licenses granted by Authority of both or either House of Parliament to any person of persons, for Printing any Diurnal, Dews oz Occurrences, thall be from hence= forth poid and of na further effect; And that no Book, Pamphlet, theet or theets of News 12 Occurrences whatsoever, that henceforth be printed, bound, flitched or put to fale by any perfon of persons whatsoever, untels the same be (537)

first approved of and Licensed under the hand of the Clerk of the Parliament, or of such person as that be authorized by the Connect of State for the time being, or (for so much may concern the affairs of the Army) under the hand of the Sea cretary of the Army for the time being, the same to be entred in their several Registers, to be by them kept for that purpole, and also in the Regifter-Book of the Company of Stationers, according to ancient custom; and the Printer thereof to put his hand thereto. Provided always, and it is hereby Declared, That the penalties in this Acterpressed, shall not extend to quit any person or persons, that thall make, Write, print, publish, fell or utter, or cause to be made, written, published, fold or uttered, any Book, Paniphlet, Treatife, Bailad, Livel, theet or theets of Rews, that Gall contain any Seditious, Treasonable or Blasphemous matter, but the offenders in fuch kinde thall be liable to fuch fur= ther penalties, as by the Laws of the Land are provided, or by Authority of Parliament thall be judged, according to the quality of such offences. And be it further Enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the Waster and wardens of the Company of Stationers London, al lifted With fuch persons as the Councel of State thall for that purpose nominate or approve, Mall and may make diligent fearth in all places where then hall think meet, for all unallowed Printingspreces, and all preces any way imployed in the printing of any such unlicensed Books, as aforelaidior of any malignant, feditious or feandalous Books, Pictures or Papers, and to leize and carry away fuch Printing-presses and Letters, together with the Aut, Spindle, and other Paterials of every such irregular Binter.

Printer, Which they finde to milimployed, unto the Common-ball of the faid Company, there to be defaced and made unferviceable, according to ancient custom, and like wife to make diligent fearch in all suspected Printing-houses, wares houses, Shops, and other places, for such unlicensed and scandalous Books, Papers, Pam= phlets, and all other such Books not entred, noz ligned with the Printers name, and place of reliancy, being printed or reprinted by fuch as have no lawful interest in them, and the same to feize; and like wife to apprehend all Authors, Printers, and other persons Whatsoever, imployed in compiling, printing, flitching, binding, publishing and dispersing of the laid scandalous and unwarrantable Papers and Books, and all those who chall asked the said parties in searching after them; and to bring the offenders, and what they wall have so seized, before such Magi-Arate or other Officers as are appointed for the execution of this Act, to be by them ordered and disposed of according to the direction and true meaning of the same Act. And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That no person or persons whatsoever, thall presume, by the Post, Carriers, or otherwise to convey, fend away, or endeabor to disperse any such units censed News as aforesaid, or any seditious or scandalous Papers, Pamphlets, Books or Pictures, to any place, or person or persons, upon pain of forfeiture of forty thillings a piece for every such Book, Pamphlet or Paper, or Imprisonment of the offender, the same not to exceed forty days; the laid penalty to be inflicted, paid and undergone, the moneys to be disposed of, and such inquiry, searches and seizures touching the same to be made, as in the case of felling

(539) felling unlicensed News is herein befoze limited and expected. And whereas the great numbers of lewd and scandalous Pamphlets and seditious Books, have been chiefly occasioned by the multitude of Printing-houles, and Prestes crected in by-places and corners, out of the eye of Gobernment, contrary to the custom and practice of former times; and in that regard some further providion is held requilite for refraining and regulating that general excels and exercise of the Preis, and prevention of the laid Enormities, It is therefore further Enacted and Dr dained by this present Parliament, and by the Authority thereof, That no Printer, nor any other person or persons whatsoever, shall from henceforth print, use or imploy any Printings prefs, Bolling-prefs, or any other Instruments for Printing, in any part or place of this Commonwealth, save onely in the City of London, and Liberties thereof, and the two Univerlities (excepting such as chait be particularly Licensed and authorized by special Deder of the Councel of State) upon pain that all and every person and persons offending contrary hereunto, thats forfeit and pay the fum of Twenty pounds, and thall have all their Printing preffes, Letters and Materials defaced, and be for ever disabled to be a Patter Printer, and Dwner of a Printing-prels: Provided, That this Clause thall not be construed to extend to the Printing press now used in the City of York, not to the Printing-press now used in Finsbury, for the Printing of Bibles and Plaims; but that the same wall be in like condition to all purpoles, as it this Act had not been had or made. And it be further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That all and every

Printer, or other person or persons whatsoever in the said City of London, who now keep Print ing-houses, of are Owners of Printing-presses, Rolling-preffes,orother Instruments for Printing; as also the Owners of the Printing-press in Finsbury aforefaid, shall before the first day of October, Due thousand six hundzed forty nine, enter into Bond, with two Sureties, of Three hundred pounds penalty to the Keepers of the Liberties of England by Authority of Parliament, Motto print, nor cause to be printed, any seditious, scan= dalous or treasonable Pamphlet, Paper, Book or Picture, dishonorable to, or against the State and Government; not any Pamphlet, Paper, or Boot of News, nor Licented as aforelaid, and Entred in the Register Book of the said Company; not fuffer their Printing-presses, or other Instruments for Printing, to be used for any fuch unlawful purpole as aforelaid; and that he and they chall also to every Book, Pamphlet, Paper or Picture he or they Chall imprint, in the Title page of each Book prese the Authors name, with his quality and place of Kelidence, or at least the Licensers names where Licenses are required, and his own Pame and place of Relidence at length, upon pain to forfeit the fum of Ten pounds for every wilful failing, and to have all his or thier Printing materials defaced , and for the second Offence, to be disabled from any more exercise of his Trade of Printing: And that like caution thall be given by the Dwner of the Press at York, to the Keepers of the Liberties of England as aforciaid, and by the Printers Within either Univerlity, to the faid Keepers of the Liberties of England, in like fum, and for like purpoles, and upon like penalties for failing, as is herein lastly

lastly mentioned, whereof the especial care to see the same performed within the time last before limited, is especially commended to the Lord Major of York, and to the faid Uice-Chancellors respectively, of which they are under their Hands and Seals to make Certificate to the Councel of State, befoze the Tenth day of October, Duc thousand fix hundred forty nine. And be it fur ther Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That no person or persons whatsoever, shall hereafter fet up a Printing press, Rolling press, or other Instrument for Printing, nor cast any Printing Letters, before they enter into Bond as aforce faid; not that any person of persons demise of let, or being within his or their dispose, suffer to be held or used any house, Clault, Cellar, or other Room whatsoever, to or by any person or persons for a Printing-house, or place to print in, unless he or they so demiling and suffering, that first give notice to the Paster or Wardens of the Stationers for the time being, of such demises or fuffering to work or print there, upon pain of forfeiture of five pounds for every luch Offence; of which intimation the Walter and Wardens are hereby enjoyned to make an Entry in their Register Book, upon like pain of forfeiture of Five pounds for every omission thereof. And be it further Enacted, That no Joyner, or Carpenter or other person, shall make any Printing: prefs or Rolling-prefs, nor any Smith thall forge any Iron-work for a Printing-preis, nor any Founder caft any Printing letters for any person or persons what soever, neither shall any person or persons import, or cause to be imported or brought into this Comonwealth, from any parts beyond the feas, any Printing press or presses, or any Letters founded Z3332

founded or call, nor thall any person or persons buy any such Presses or Letters for printing.unles he or they respectively that first acquaint the Matter and the wardens of the aforelaid Company for the time being, for whom the fame prefs, Fron Works of Letters are to be made, forged, imported, bought or cast, upon pain of forfeiture of ave pounds for every such Offence; of which intimation the Malter & wardens are to make Entry in their faid Register, upon like Penaity of forfeiture of five pounds for every omission thereof. And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That no person or persons Whatfoever, thall Import any frandalous or fee ditious Books, Pamphlets of Papers, upon pain of forfeiture of tive pounds for every fuch Book, Pamphlet or Paper; nor hall any person or perfons land any Imported Books, at any Port or place of this Commonwealth, save onely at the Port of London; And that no Drifats, Packs, Maunds, Chefts, or Fardels of Books, be permitted by any Officers of the Cultoms o: Excise to be opened or conveyed away, before notice given, and the same be viewed by the said Master and wardens of the laid Company, or such as they thall appoint, upon pain of forfeiture of Five pounds for every such Offence, so as the Malter and wardens of their Deputies, do make the laid view within forty eight hours after such notice, which they are hereby required to make. upon pain of forfeiture of Five pounds for every omission of such view as aforesaid. And it is also Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That for the encouragement of all Regular Printers, and support of the said Manufactures in this Commonwealth, That no person of persons whatfoever.

bring in, or cause to be Imported or brought into this Commonwealth, from any part whatsoever, any English Bibles, Plaims, or any Book of Books, of part of Book of Books formerly printed in this Commonwealth; nor thall binde, Aitch, or put to fale, any such Book or Books, upon pain of loss and forfeiture of the fame, and of Ten Chillings for every Book fo imported, bound, fitched, or put to fale. And be it further Enacted. That no person or persons whatsoever in this Commonwealth, hall here= after print or reprint any Book, Books, or part of any Book or Books, Legally granted to the said Company of Stationers, for their relief or maintenance of their poor, Without the License and consent of the Patter, wardens and Assistants of the said Company; not any Book oz Books, oz partof Book oz Books, now entred in the Register Book of the said Company, or which hereafter thall be duly entred in the faid Register Book, for any particular Member of the said Company Without the like consent of the owner or owners thereof, nor counterfeit the Pame, Wark of Title of any Book or Books, belonging to the faid Company of particular members; noz hall any person of persons

binde, fitch or put to fale any such Book or

and fuch like persons, divers unlicensed and other scandalous and seditious Books, Papers, Pamphlets and Pictures, to the great abule of the Parliament, and prejudice of the People, Be it Enacted by the Authority aforelaid, That any two Magistrates intrusted with the Execution of this Act respectively, shall have vower upon any just occasion of suspition, to grant warrants under their hands and Seals, to some sufficient persons, to search Packs and Packets, and feize and bring away such Books, Papers and Pamphlets, to those who granted the faid warrants, to the end the Penalties may be levied upon the offenders, and disposed of according to the tenor and true meaning of this present Act. And be it Enacted by the Authouty aforesaid, That all unlicensed Books and Pamphlets of News, and all seditious, scandalous and libellous Books, Pamphlets, Pictures and Papers, to be feized by vertue of this Act, thail after the condemnation of the offender with whom they are taken, or to whom they belong (if the offender may be difcovered and known) be brought, conveyed or fent, and fafely delivered to the Secretary to the Councel of State, to be disposed of to the fire or otherwise, as that Councel Hall direct, and be in the mean time safely preserved by the Officers or persons who seize the same, or by those to whom they make delivery thereof, and give account of their imployment, according to the true meaning of this Act. And whereas divers vagrant persons, of idle conversation, having forfaken their usual Callings, and accustomed themselves after the maner of hawkers, to fell and cry about the streets, and in (545)

other places, Pamphiets, and other Books, and under colour thereof, are found to disperse all forts of vangerous Libels, to the intolerable diffionor of the Parliament, and the Whole Government of this Commonwealth; Be it Didained and Enacted by the Authority aforelaid, That no such hawkers thall be any more permitted; and that they and all Ballad-lingers, wherefoever they are or may be apprehended, thall forfeit all Books, Pamphlets, Ballads and Papers by them exposed to fale, and thall, by fuch as thall by vertue of this Act leize upon them, be conveyed and carried to the house of Correction, there to be whipt as common Rogues, and then dilmilled, the Reepers of which house are hereby enjoyined to receive fuch personers, and fee this penalty executed, Without expecting further warrant, and where no fuch House of Correction is, those who leize uponfuch offenders, thail deliver them over to the Constable of the Parish or Liberty where they are apprehended, who is forthwith to cause the offenders to be whipt as common Rogues, upon pain of forfeiture of Forty thit lings, to be paid by luch Reepers of the Houle of Correction or Constable, omitting, neglecting or refuting to do their duty herein: The faid offences in this clause mentioned to be exannined, and the penalties levied, and to be difpoled of in fuch lost and maner, as concerning the penalties of fuch as vend unlicensed and scandalous Books and Pamphlets, is herein before directed and expressed: And the Lord Pajor and Common Councel of the City of London, are hereby required to take care that the good Laws of their City against Hawkers,

and that this present Act against them and other offenders, be put in full and speedy execution Within their City and Liberties thereof, as they tender the Honor thereof, and of Government : And all Constables, Headbozoughs, and other Officers and Ministers, are hereby ensoyned to leize upon such last mentioned Offenders wheresoever they may be found, and to cause the penalties of the Law to be upon them executed, upon the penalty last before mentioned. And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforelaid, That whatfoever penalties in money thall be levied and received by the pains, industry and profecution of the Compamy of Stationers (whose vigilancy and care herein is especially required that be disposed of as followeth; viz. After satisfaction of their charges in inquiry and profecution, the one movety of the relidue that be by them received and reserved for the use of the poor of their Com= pany, and the other movety, or one half, for the use of the Commonwealth, to be yearly by them answered, and paid into the receipt of the publique Exchequer: And the Justices of the Apper Bench, Justices of Oyer and Terminer, within the limits of their Commission, Justices of Alsize in their several Circuits, Justices of Goal Delivery, and Justices of Peace, as well Within the Liberties as Without, within the limits of their several Commissions in their general Selsions, or other Selsions, which they or any two or more of them (whereof one of them to be of the Quorum) may and that appoint at their pleasure, where and when need thall require, thall by vertue hereof have full power and authority, and are hereby frictly enjoyned to

Offences afozelaid, and to give in charge the Presentment of the same; and they and all other Officers and Ministers concerned, are hereby enjoyned and required to be careful and diligent in the discharge of their duty in the premiles, according to the tenor and direction of this present Act: And all Officers Civil and Military, Soldiers, and other well-affected people, are hereby specially enjoyned to be ayding and assitting to the execution of this Act, and to feize upon the persons of all such as thall prefume to rescue, or actually endeavor to rescue from apprehension or punishment the offenders against this Act, to cause such Countenancers and Difturbers to be immediately brought before some Justice of the Peace, who is to binde them by a Recognizance with good Sureties to the Good Behavior, and to apa pear at the next Selsions for the Peace, there to be Indicted, Fined, and further dealt with, according to Law, and as the quality of such High Contempts may deferbe: And luch laid Offenders as are not able to finde Sureties,

are to be caused to be set in the Stocks near to the place where the Offence was commit-

ted, and to be Imprisoned there for the space

of fourhours. And because the life of all good

Laws, is the due execution thereof, and that

the careful observance of this Act, and a strict

enquiry into, and punishment of Offenders

against the same, will be of especial concerns

wealth, Be it further Enacted by the Authority

aforelaid, That the Councel of State appointed

enquire, hear and determine all and every the

by the Parliament, thall hereby have power and authority to enquire into, and from time to time to receive an accompt of all wilful defaults and contempts of Officers or others, who neglecting or refuting to do their duties, thall thereby obstruct the Remedies provided by this Act; and are hereby enjoymed and required, by all good ways and means to remove such obstructions, and out of the penalties or otherwise, to reward prosecutors or discoverers of Offenders, and to cause this Act to be put in full and effectual execution. And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforelaid, That in and upon any Action, Plaint or Buit to be brought against any Officer, or person or pers fons, for any thing by them acted or done by force of this present Act, every such Officer and perfon Chall and may plead the General Issue there= to, and give this Act, and the whole special matter in Ebidence; and if the Clerdict pals against the Plaintiff or Plaintiffs, or the Plaintiff or Plaintiffs of Come non-Suit, or luffer any Dic continuance thereof, That then the Defendant and Defendants wall recover his and their double Costs for their wrongful veration in defence of the faid Action or Suit, for which he and they thall have like remedy, as in other cases where Colls by the Laws of this Commonwealth are given to the Defendants: Provided always, and be it Enacted by the authority aforesaid, That no person or persons thall be molested or impeached for any the Offences mentioned in this Act, unless he or they be thereof accused Within lie moneths after his or their Offence lo committed or done. Provided allo, That this Act be in force, and to have continuance until the Pine and twentieth day of September, which hall be in the Pear of our Lord, One thousand fix hundred fifty and one, and no longer.
